\$2.3 Million Saved by District Action

The District recently refinanced its 2011 Certificates of Participation, thereby lowering its annual debt service payments, saving more than \$2.3 million over the next 14 years. The savings will provide additional funds for capital improvements.

In upgrading the credit rating of the District's refunding bonds to "AA+" (one of the highest ratings available), Standard and Poors cited the District's strong operational and financial management as the key reasons for its decision to upgrade.

What is Good for the Environment, Supports Birds and Wildlife, and is Cost-Effective?

ANSWER: The District's Reclamation Area. Since the mid-1980s, the District has embraced an environmentally friendly, cost-effective strategy to reuse its high-quality, treated wastewater in spring and summer to maintain wildlife ponds and irrigate pastures.



You can catch views of the reclamation area on either side of Highway 37 between Highway 101 and Atherton Avenue.

The District's 800+ acres of wildlife ponds and pastures on the north and south sides of Highway 37 also provide habitat for birds and wildlife. The District annually hosts bird counts conducted by Point Blue and the Marin Audubon Society. The most recent

bird survey in December 2017 found 48 species, including hawks, egrets, and several species of ducks. The complete list of birds found at the District's reclamation ponds is available on the District's website.
